




I'M SLEEPING OUT'

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## 2013-2017 Tracy Family Foundation Long Range Strategic Plan

The Tracy family now spans four generations, with more than 80 family members between the ages of 85 and less than one year old. All of this is led by Tracy family matriarch Dorothy Tracy.

Family members in the first, second, and third generations serve on the Foundation board and committees, as well as actively participate in the Matching and Next Generation grant programs. Through these engagement opportunities, family members increase their knowledge about the nonprofit sector and are inspired to give their time, talent, and treasures back to nonprofit organizations. Wanting to tap into the energy and appetite of the members of the third generation (53 and counting!), in 2013, the Foundation formed a Next Generation Advisory Board. The Next Generation Advisory Board (NGAB) exists to cultivate an understanding of philanthropy and build leadership skills in the next generations.

#### **Matching Grant Program**

**Program Description:** TFF trustees and Tracy family members ages 16 and older are eligible to apply for grant funds for a nonprofit organization if the trustee or family member personally contributes to the nonprofit organization.

# **AREA** WE SERVE

The primary geographic focus area of the Foundation is west central Illinois. We refer to this area as the "Region." Nonprofit organizations in the counties of Adams, Brown, Cass, Greene, Hancock, McDonough, Morgan, Pike, Schuyler and Scott are eligible to submit online applications to the Foundation. In addition, the Foundation provides grants throughout the United States of America, but grants outside of the Region are by invitation only.



## **Brown County**

Brown County is located in west central Illinois. It is in this county that Robert and Dorothy Tracy raised their 12 children and founded the family business – Dot Foods. The family and the Foundation are committed to Brown County as evidenced by the Brown County Commitment Statement.

#### **Brown County Commitment Statement**

As the geographic region of the Tracy Family Foundation continues to expand in years to come, it is the intent of the Board of Trustees to forever remain financially committed to Brown County. Applications from this area will always be given highest priority for funding if the requests match the Mission of the Foundation. (Statement adopted by the TFF board in 1999)

#### 2013 Brown County Community Survey



# 2013-17 LONG RANGE STRATEGIC PLAN (LRSP)

Since 1998, the Tracy Family Foundation has provided grants to numerous nonprofit organizations in west central Illinois. We have learned about the many needs, issues and challenges facing the nonprofit sector in this part of the country. As a family and as a foundation, we are driven to provide support that leads to positive, strategic change in the communities we serve.

During the years of 2013- 2017, the Foundation will focus their efforts in Education, Youth & Families, Leadership, and Economic Development (Brown County only). The engine to drive activities in these focus areas are the Foundation Board, Next Generation Advisory Board, and numerous committees.



# Focus area - EDUCATION

**Definition:** Activities and organizations that directly impact academic achievements and excellence from early childhood through post-secondary graduation

During 2013-2017, the focus of our education efforts will be in the following areas: Brown County Schools (K-12 and post-secondary), Catholic Schools, Early Education, and School Leadership.

#### Brown County Schools – K-12

High quality schools have become the No. 1 priority! In the 2013 Brown County Community Survey survey, 93 percent ranked schools as a high priority, while in 2005 only 76 percent of the respondents ranked schools as a high priority. In 2006, the Tracy Family Foundation began an active partnership with the K-12 schools in an effort to improve academic achievement for "Every Student. Every Level." The school efforts are paying off with the students of Brown County coming out as the winners! In 2006, the average ACT score for BCHS was 17.6. In 2013, the average ACT score was 20.3! While progress has been made, there continue to be many opportunities for improvement.

#### Brown County – Post-Secondary Education

The Foundation funds a college scholarship program for Brown County High School graduates. Grant funds for this program are awarded to Scholarship America, the administrator of the program. Currently, there are 26 college students who are recipients of scholarship dollars. The Foundation's goal is for 50 percent of BCHS graduates to earn a bachelor's degree within five years of graduating from high school. This is also a work in progress, and there's still more to do to reach our goal.

#### Early Education

In the 2013-2017 Long Range Strategic Plan, the Foundation expanded their definition of education from K-12 to "birth through adults." We are looking to invest dollars in activities and programs that will serve to prepare children to be kindergarten ready. Where to invest is the question. Do we invest in cognitive development, social/ emotional skills development, language and literacy development, or physical development? Should we focus on the child, family, school or daycare, or the community? In late 2013, the Foundation hired a part-time contractual agent to research and identify potential avenues of investment by the Foundation in the area of early education.

#### Catholic Schools

The Catholic faith and Catholic schools are a legacy of Robert and Dorothy Tracy. Since 2010, the Foundation has been working proactively with 10 Catholic schools in west central Illinois. We are focused on four Pillars of Excellence – Enrollment at Capacity, Financial Stability, Academic Excellence, and Catholic Identity. Our goal is Catholic schools that thrive, not just survive.

- Schools: Blessed Sacrament School (Quincy), Our Saviour School (Jacksonville), Quincy Notre Dame High School, Routt Catholic High School (Jacksonville), St. Dominic School (Quincy), St. Francis School (Quincy), St. Francis Holy Ghost School (Jerseyville), St. John the Evangelist School (Carrollton), St. Peter School (Quincy), and St. Mary School (Mt. Sterling)

# Focus area - Youth & Families

Definition: Activities and organizations that work to build strong kids, families, and communities.

The Tracy family is blessed with a huge support system of family members. Robert and Dorothy Tracy are first generation (1G). They have twelve children, whom are all married, that comprise the second generation of 24 family members (2Gs). There are 52 family members in the third generation (3Gs). There are 7 members of the fourth generation (4Gs). We as a family and a Foundation believe in the strength and importance of a strong family unit.

In 2013, the Foundation's efforts were simply reactive. In 2014, a proactive effort will identify activities that will serve to strengthen the family unit.

# Focus area - Leadership

**Definition:** Activities that build Brown County and the Region's capacity for leadership by providing the resources, knowledge, and connections that community members and students need to shape the future of these communities.

With leadership being a new focus area for the Foundation, much of 2013 was spent researching potential points of entry for the Foundation to invest in 2014 and beyond. Opportunities and vehicles for developing school, civic, and youth leadership are being explored.

For years, the Foundation has invested in leadership activities in Brown County schools. Strategies and activities are being analyzed that will allow the Foundation to support and develop school leadership in all of west central Illinois.

Our hope is to empower Brown County and west central Illinois by helping to develop strong youth and adult leaders with a vision for their community and schools.



The 2013 Brown County Survey found that 73 percent of survey respondents agree that Brown County community members want more leadership opportunities.

# Focus area - Economic Development (BROWN COUNTY ONLY)

**Definition:** Activities and organizations that support the implementation and sustainability of the 2011 Mt. Sterling Uptown Long Range Strategic Plan and the economic development and wellbeing of Brown County.

"Empty storefronts"; "So many buildings need repaired"; "We want Mt. Sterling to be how it used to be when we grew up." This was feedback received from Brown County community members in 2010 when asked by the Foundation about revitalizing Uptown.

At the request of the Tracy Family Foundation and the Mt. Sterling Uptown Steering Committee, Kiku Obata & Company partnered with the citizens of Mt. Sterling in 2011 to help shape important aspects of the future of Mt. Sterling through the creation of a Long-Range Strategic Plan.

Much progress has been made since the inception of the plan. Individuals, nonprofit organizations and businesses are working to turn the vision into reality for a "vibrant and attractive Uptown that attracts and retains entities which draw people to Brown County to shop, work, live, and explore."

#### Process

All requests to the foundation must be submitted online through the Tracy Family Foundation website: www.tracy-foundation.org

Pre-applications are required for the Brown County Teacher Fund, Catholic Schools, and Formal Funding grant programs. Once the pre-application is submitted, an organization will be contacted regarding an invitation to apply for a grant. Capacity Building, Matching Grants, and Next Generation grants do not require pre-applications.
